Son of John Henry and Emily Maria Hall, of Newton Villa, Ross, Herefordshire.

The first burials were made in Plot I of the cemetery in September 1915, but it was most heavily used during the Battle of Arras, which began in April 1917. The dead were brought to the cemetery from casualty clearing stations, but between May and August 1918 the cemetery was used by fighting units. Lapugnoy Military Cemetery contains 1,324 Commonwealth burials of the First World War.

Charles Henry Hall was born in Ross in 1894, the son of John and Emily Hall. John was a coal merchant and in 1901 the family were living in Ashfield Ross. By 1911 at the age of 17 Charles was a farm pupil with Francis Perkins at Hadnock Cross Monmouth. He was living in Much Marcle when he enlisted in Oswestry and first joined the Shropshire Yeomanry. He was transferred to the 10th Battalion King's Shropshire Light Infantry and Charles died of wounds in October 1918 and is buried in Lapugnoy.
