Arthur Askwith Stoddard was born in January 1883 in Tavoy Burma the son of Arthur Askwith Stoddard a Civil Engineer. Arthur returned to England and stayed with his uncle in Potter Newton and studied Engineering at Manchester University. He was awarded a Bsc (1st Class Engineering) in 1902. He was a temporary draughtsman at Chatham Dockyard until 1903 and then was posted to India to be an Assistant Engineer, Permanent Imperial Service in Indian Public Works and went to Lahore. He was an expert in irrigation and took out a patent on his method of restricting the flow of water in pipes for irrigation. He enlisted and was in the Indian Reserve of Officers and was attached to the 3rd Sappers and Miners. He contracted an illness whilst serving in Mesopotamia and returned to England. Arthur married Winifred Smith in Newport, Gwent in 1917 and the moved to Monkswalk Cottage Much Marcle. Arthur died in December 27<sup>th</sup> 1918 and is buried in the churchyard at Much Marcle.
